Why I do what I do:. I believe in the Vision of Big Brothers Big Sisters that "all children achieve success in life." It is my desire to assist in giving children the emotional support and mentoring that can motivate him or her to be the best citizen possible by instilling respect, dignity and pride. Why I do what I do? By investing in the future, which is the children. Children need loving, caring individuals who will support and encourage them to be all they can be. I decided to be that beacon in children's lives. I have spent my career as a public servant in higher education by exposing children to a world of possibilities. We must provide children with the tools

Morehead Elementary School took part in the African American Read In today. Lady A. Rawiya Nash and Lady Pearlie Bryan are retired educators. They read literature written by and about African Americans to 400 students and teachers at Morehead Elementary School beginning at 8 :15 a.m. as part of the National African American Read In.

The National African American Read In is the nation's first band oldest event dedicated to diversity in literature. It was established in 1990 by the Black Caucus of the National Council of Teachers of English to make literacy a significant part of Black History Month. This reached more than 6 million participants around the world.


